TOWN APPROPRIATION REQUESTS: It is time to start thinking about appropriation requests and write ups for the town report. The deadline for requesting appropriation for your organization is December 20th. Why not do it early so you don't forget about it. Please also remember to include a one-page write up for the town report, making sure that it fits on one page only.

TOWN MEETING DEADLINES: *Town Meeting will be on March 3, 2018, Robinson School multipurpose room, 9:00 a.m.*

January 18, 2018 – Last day for voters to file a petition with the town clerk to have an article appear on the ballot. Petition must contain signatures from at least 5% (or 68) of the registered voters in town.

January 29, 2018 – Nominating petitions and Consent of Candidate forms for town offices must be filed with the town clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. Petitions must be signed by at least 14 registered voters.

January 30, 2017 – Last day that a candidate seeking office can register to vote, in order to have their name printed on the ballot. The candidate should register before submitting their petition.

Select Board News

The following is a summary of the most significant information from SB meetings. It is not a complete or official record of the meetings. For more information read official meeting minutes on the Town website. Submitted by Rebecca Elder, Selectboard Assistant.

Nov. 7, 2017 meeting

- **Road report:** Tires are needed for the grader. There may be remaining funds in the road maintenance category that could be applied. Road crew to post new speed limit signage on Jerusalem Road. A new pick-up truck should likely be included in the upcoming budget. Tool inventory is needed at the town shed.
- A generator is needed for use at the Town office as it is the hub of communication during emergencies. Heat is also needed to prevent frozen pipes.
- Green Lantern Solar project/former landfill site: After revisions to the Option, the SB signed a preliminary Option to Lease so that additional assessment work could be completed.
A public informational hearing will be held on Tues., 12/12 at 6:30 at the Robinson Elementary multi-purpose room.
- Zoning Admin vacancy to be advertised
- Palmer grievance to proceed through the court system. Jim Carroll to represent the town.
- After further discussion and a vote, the SB will not pursue any re-classifications at this time. Options for improved signage and assistance with maintenance to be explored.
- Land swap/transfer with Robinson School: the SB will retain Jim Runcie to draw up a P&S agreement for the land swap as agreed to with the School Board.
- Maintenance updates: SB is reviewing RFPs for roof replacement and porch improvements; front entrance ramp repair; new board installed for posting announcements outside Town Office; mold test performed with negative result; other moisture reduction remedies including dehumidifiers to be used; Post office window needs repair; town office lights upgraded to LED.

Nov. 21, 2017 meeting

- **Road report:** Grader tires cost estimate = \$2900/each. Six are needed; temporary driveway permit issued to A. Johnson for logging at intersection of Browns Hill/Big Hollow Roads.
- Conservation Comm. requested a new appointment to fill a vacant seat. To be discussed in December.
- Discussion re: generators purchased by the Addison Co. Regional Planning Comm. in 2002. They can be used by the town, one for the school and one for the Fire Dept. Town is responsible for maintenance.
- Zoning Administrator position to be advertised next week in the Addison Independent, 7 Days, and various job lists. Applications to be directed to the Town Clerk. See website for job description.
- **Jerusalem Schoolhouse:** JS committee requested approval for a survey to be completed to confirm property boundaries. SB will review the plan, plot info available, and will discuss in December.
- Maintenance updates: Post office window was repaired. Other items deferred to Dec.
- Budget meeting to be scheduled in early December. Town Clerk is tracking requests for appropriation.

Don't forget the Memory Tree. Applications in the November Gazette and also available at the Town Office. Applications due by Thursday, Dec 21st. Tree lighting on Friday, December 22nd.

The sanctuary will be lit by the mirrored oil lamp chandelier, dating from 1884, and many candles. This non-denominational service has been held for over 50 years and is a Christmas tradition for many area residents. The Meeting House is located in the center of Starksboro Village on VT Route 116, just north of the Town offices. Parking is available to the rear in the town center parking area or at the First Baptist Church, where the memory tree program begins at 7:00 pm.

The Meeting House was built in 1838-40 and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

There will be candy canes, hot chocolate and hot cider along with plenty of yummy cookies and other treats for everyone to enjoy! So, bring your kids, grandkids, neighbors, friends and good 'ol granny for an afternoon of fun and good cheer!

Two more South Starksboro residents have put "pen to paper" and given us their story about why they moved to South Starksboro, why they stay and what they love most about this community...enjoy the following stories from Alice Dubenetsky, who lives on Dan Sargent Road with her husband, Dan....and Bob Hall, who lives on Route 17 with his wife, Blair...I think you will agree that these folks absolutely LOVE the South Starksboro community. Read on~~~

ALICE DUBENETSKY: "Dan and I moved to South Starksboro as a direct result of our realtor losing patience with us and wanting to make a point--or perhaps teach us a lesson. He had tried very hard to sell us raised ranches in Chittenden County, and when I finally told him I wanted an older farmhouse, with some land, and maybe a barn, on a back road, for under \$100,000 (this was 1985), he arranged for us to look at the Metz house on Dan Sargent Road.

The ride up Meehan Road was very quiet, as in, no one in the car said a word. It was mostly undeveloped then with some rundown places here and there, and it was right in the middle of mud season. When we pulled into the "drive", Dan initially declined to get out of the car. The house was, in fact, a total wreck -- peeling paint, no front porch other than a couple of railroad tie steps, grass surrounding it that was literally 12 feet high and so thick we had to cut our way to the old barn. It smelled of bats, was littered with cluster flies and was crooked all over. Dan was aghast. I fell instantly in love, seeing possibilities rather than the obvious deficiencies. The great big stone fireplace in the living room capped it off for me. It took a couple of days and some "persuasion" but finally Dan agreed to give it a try.

Our realtor was stunned when we put in an offer, and tried to gently point out that it just wasn't the right place for a couple of town-raised young people with no real skills but we insisted. The bank was also a bit flabbergasted, but finally relented and loaned us the money when we agreed to paint the exterior right away. And so, we started work on our new home and the never-ending project that continues to this day.

We built our wonderful life here in South Starksboro, and raised our two children, surrounded by sheep, horses, chickens, dogs, cats and - briefly - a couple of big, unruly goats. We've made a lot of friends, and we both have served on various committees and boards. The 'boro took us in, welcoming us like family. We have a deep love for this special community. We can't imagine living anywhere else."

BOB HALL (with help from Blair): HOW I CAME TO SOUTH STARKSBORO: "My introduction to South Starksboro was in 1957. A boyhood friend, Bruce Gale, went to Middlebury College where he met his future wife, Marion Keith. They married and soon purchased the Chick Hallock farm (first farmhouse on the right on Gore Road. Their son, Bill, still owns the property). I was doing my two years active duty at Fort Benning during this time but found a way to visit the Gale's to ski. Skiing was the reason that drew me to the area. Sometime during the next year the Frank Wells property came up for sale (That's the house where John Clarke and Nancy Cornell live) and with help from the family, I bought it.

In the summer of 1960, when my army career was done I began spending more and more time here. I was young, single, had a flashy sports car and a monstrous ego. (It wasn't much later that the sports car broke down and my ego took a hit - I vividly remember the tongue lashing I got from Sam Stokes, "To leave my out-of-state attitude in New York". I deserved it). The Frank Wells house was in pretty rough shape and my priority switched from wanna-be ski bum to carpenter's helper to get the house in livable order. Fortunately for me,

Gardner Orvis came to the rescue. Gardner was one of those wonderful Vermonters who could do anything and everything and did. He was the one who renovated Bruce and Marion's house and I was lucky to have him help me.

During the summer of 1960 Floyd and Sadie Thompson put their farm, store and acreage up for sale. My Dad, who was always a frustrated farmer, was ready to retire and leave the New York rat race. Which he did, and as a family we purchased the Thompson property. Now I was hooked. Winter and skiing is one thing, but summer in Vermont is something else again. In those days you came to Vermont because you wanted to, then you found a way to make a living. For me it was renovating houses with Gardner and later building new ones.

In the winter of 1964 I met my future wife, Blair, at Mad River Glen, So what made us stay and why do we like the community? I think it sneaks up on you. You have a job, you have obligations to your friends and the people you work with. You vote. You become interested in Town affairs. Then along come the children with school and Little League. And you realize that this is home and there is no other place you would rather be!"

Just a little sidebar (from Bob)... "The early sixties turned out to be a momentous era for South Starksboro. There were still several operating farms shipping milk - Archie Stokes, Sewell Hallock, Sam Stokes, Milton Eliot, Herman Orvis, Betty Norris, Robert Young to name a few. When the State required bulk tanks be installed, some farmers with only a few cows were forced out of business. Even though the farms were disappearing the area was discovered by skiers and out-of-staters. Two of the houses we had renovated were rented by ski clubs. Bea and Ernie Quittner turned the Phillip Hallock house into a ski lodge. Many of the old houses and hunting camps were bought and turned into ski houses, and in some cases, year round homes. On any given winter weekend South Starksboro probably "slept" 100 skiers. Land began to increase in value. Lots were sold and new homes were built. The dirt road from the end of the McCullough Turnpike to Route 116 was paved and became Route 17. Skiers from the south and west found the trip to Mad River and Sugarbush even easier. However, by the 1970s condominiums over the mountain were cheaper to buy and rent so the ski traffic migrated from here to there. So here are are today. A pretty good place to live but more and more a bedroom community."

Our school district is in transition. As a result of the November 2016 vote of all 5 towns (Starksboro, Bristol, Lincoln, Monkton and New Haven), our school districts are consolidating so as of July 1, 2018, will be governed by one 13-member board, (the Mt. Abraham Unified School District Board) instead of one board for each of the schools. Starksboro's representatives on the MAUSD board are Caleb Elder and Jodi Bachand.

In this transition year, our local, Robinson Board will be meeting less frequently than in the past. All meetings take place at Mt. Abraham Union Middle/High School (instead of monthly meetings at Robinson School). Please note the 2017-2018 Robinson Board meeting schedule below:

Vacancies on both Mt. Abraham Board and on Mt. Abraham Unified District Board

Longtime Mt. Abraham Board member Jodi Bachand, who was also elected to the new MAUSD board, has retired from both of these positions. Both boards are seeking Starksboro residents interested in serving out the remainder of the respective terms.

The 13 member Mt. Abraham Union Middle/High School board term will run until the completion of this board's work. With the consolidation vote last year, the responsibilities of this board will end with the completion of the FY'18 audit this fall.

**MAUD Board - Update and
Introduction of Community Engagement Subcommittee**

Regular meetings of the newly formed MAUSD Board are well under way, and the task of developing a FY 2019 Budget has also begun. Given the importance of reaching out to our community about our ongoing work, the MAUSD Board has created a Community Engagement subcommittee. This subcommittee is tasked with figuring out how the MAUSD Board can best reach out to our community members, and to respond to concerns that are raised. To this end, we will be sending out surveys in the coming months asking about how you would like to be engaged by this Board in the future. We want your feedback!

In addition to our regular monthly meetings, it's important for our Board to periodically meet with the community in a different forum: Community Engagement meetings. In a Community Engagement meeting, Central Office staff are not required to be present or to facilitate the meeting. We hope that these Board-run Community Engagement meetings can allow for a free-flowing conversation on any given topic, with more back-and-forth discussion than might be possible at regular Board meetings. Ultimately, it is our hope that these Community Engagement meetings will provide a source of additional context and information for both community members and Board members.
