This month we have a wonderful story from Lisa and John Bonar. The Bonar family lives on Jerusalem Road...they are close neighbors to the schoolhouse! We hope you enjoy reading about how they came to call South Starksboro home and why they love this community. THANK YOU Lisa and John for sharing with us!

### ***South Starksboro VT - Lisa and John Bonar***

John and I have lived together in South Starksboro for 20 years raising our 3 children, Hannah, Ryan and Laura. How we came to live here and why we stay here stems back to the late 1950's.

Our life in South Starksboro started with my grandparents, John and Betty Yuhas. They were from NJ and would come to VT to visit their friends Ernie & Bea Quittner. My father was only 15 at the time and instantly fell in love with the country

side. He made several friends and wanted to spend as much time here as possible. As a result, my grandparents ended up buying a farm & land from the Orvis family so they would have a place to spend their summer vacations. When my father turned 18 he joined the Airforce. He spent two years based in Massachusetts where he met and married my mother and then went to live overseas in England for 2 years. He always had the dream of one day coming back to VT to make a home with his family. That dream came true when IBM offered him a job in Essex as soon as he completed his military service. My parents moved to VT in 1965 after already having 2 children. They moved in the farmhouse which at the time had no running water and a pot belly stove for heat. Only a year later my grandparents made the permanent move here so they could be closer to the family and help raise their grandchildren. In 1968 my parents built a house right next door on Jerusalem Road so they could have a place of their own. This is where I came along!

I was born the very same year my parents built our house. I grew up here in South Starksboro with the comfort and security of being in a community that supported each other and watched over each other. My parents were very involved in the community and the school. I spent much of my child hood on the farm helping my grandparents raise goats, cows, pigs, sheep and chickens. 4-H became a big part of my community involvement at a young age. There were many adults in the Starksboro community who supported the 4-H club and were great mentors. I had no desire to live anywhere else until after college. As a typical 22-year-old I wanted to experience living 'away from home'. I moved to Pennsylvania where I worked and met my husband John. John grew up in a small rural town in western PA. A hard-core Steelers fan! His father passed away when he was only 14 years old and so his mother, 2 sisters and his church community were his pillars. Only 2 years after we met John and I married. We had a beautiful wedding here in VT. In 1996 we had our first daughter, Hannah. We quickly realized the things that were most important to both of us in growing up were family, friends, community and a healthy environment. It was at that point we decided to move back to my hometown in VT to raise our family. When we first moved back, we lived with 4 generations in my parent's house: Grandparents, parents, us and our daughter. While my grandmother did not live much longer after moving back here, my parents were around to spend many special years with their grandchildren. Now that our 3 children have spent 14-21 years of their lives here they remind us often how thankful they are that they too have been able to grow up in this very special place.

The Select Board approved the formation of a new Starksboro Energy Committee in February, with a mission to work with residents, businesses, and the Town to ensure our community's long-term energy future and energy independence by changing the way we use, produce, and relate to energy. The initial committee is made up of Pete Antos-Ketcham, Jeff Dunham, Richard Faesy, Phil Mosenthal and Megan Nedzinski, with participation from Chris Marion and Susan Thompson.

We have lots of ideas for helping the Town with our energy future and independence, including working on the energy sections of the town plan, providing input into the solar siting proposals coming into town, helping guide Robinson School through energy efficiency while engaging students in the process, exploring a firewood coop, sponsoring speakers and workshops and other activities.

Vermont Electric Cooperative (VEC) is inviting VEC members to help test a cutting-edge energy management technology designed to make the electric grid cleaner, cheaper, and easier to run.

Would you be interested in participating in this innovative pilot project? If you're eligible, you can get a total of \$50 in electric bill credits and be entered into two raffles for a \$500 cash prize!

Here's how it would work: a technician would install a device (pictured here) developed by Burlington startup Packetized Energy on water heater, enabling it to heat water when electricity is to avoid times when it's scarce.

There'd be no change to the supply or availability of hot water household, and it wouldn't alter the amount you pay for. You'll be able to override the device at any time through a program at any time.

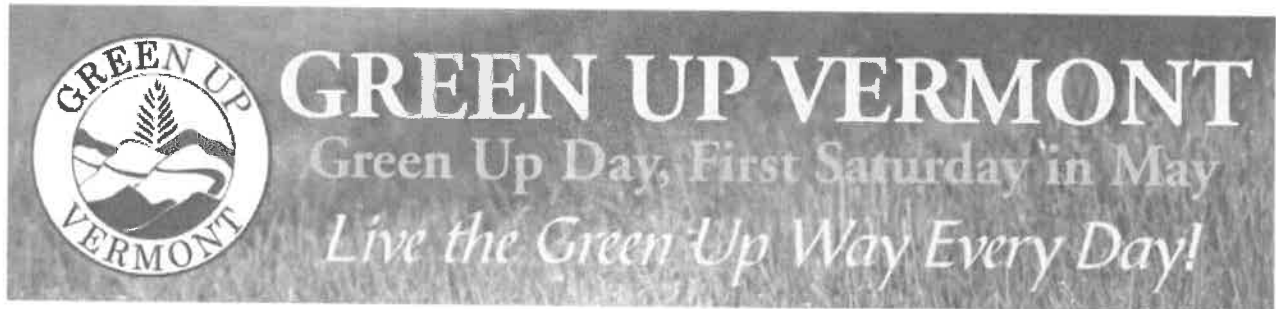
